# DICK SWANSON, PHOTOGRAPHER: BIOGRAPHY AND CAREER INFORMATION

# QUICK FACTS ABOUT RICHARD C. "DICK" SWANSON AND HIS PHOTOGRAPHY

- Born in 1933 in Caro, Michigan (grew up in nearby Vassar)
- As a teenager owned a commercial photography business
- Between 1948-1952 created hundreds of images with a Graflex large format 4x5 camera (photo journalism and social documentary styles)
- Moved to South Florida in 1961 to practice dentistry
- From the 1970s to 2000s lived part time in Western North Carolina
- Participated in photography workshops led by Ruth Bernhard, Eva Rubinstein and Garry Winogrand
- From the 1970s to 2000s created thousands of images with a 35mm SLR in a range of styles including abstract, experimental and "street photography"
- Referred to his portfolio as "Second Generation Photographs" because they reflected two eras in America separated by 30 years in the life of the photographer
- Exhibited his prints in over 70 national and international exhibitions, including dozens of national juried shows
- Was an amateur jazz piano player, an early member of the American Kitefliers Association, and an avid recreational kayaker
- Died in 2009 in Fernandina Beach, Florida, at the age of 76

#### BIOGRAPHY AND ARTISTIC ANALYSIS BY MARK SWANSON

# The Young Commercial Photographer and Social Documentarian (Michigan, 1940s-50s)

Richard Conrad "Dick" Swanson was born on May 2, 1933, in Caro, Michigan, and grew up in nearby Vassar. The middle child of Dr. Ewald C. Swanson and Mrs. Alma Swanson, *née* Weidemann, Dick Swanson took an interest in photography at an early age; one of his earliest photos is an image made with a pinhole camera in 1947.

While a student at Vassar High School Swanson bought a professional Graflex Speed Graphic 4x5 large format camera and started his own commercial photography business, the Vassar Photo Service. Between 1948 and 1952 he took hundreds of photographs for local newspapers and businesses, as well as the high school. These black and white images captured virtually every aspect of a typical small Midwestern U.S. town shortly after World War II. The subjects included school cooks and football players; power plants and old hotel rooms; car wrecks and weddings. Several images documented post-war events such as memorial ceremonies and the immigration of European refugees.

Some of the more interesting photographs of this period come from Swanson's coverage of the Vassar Centennial celebration in 1949. Over several days, as residents donned vintage nineteenth-century clothing and participated in activities of a bygone era, Swanson created dozens of striking (and often humorous) images in which time and place are ambiguous, and whose subjects appear at once familiar and strange. Like the Farm Security Administration photographers of the 1930s and early 1940s, Swanson understood that a documentary photograph could also have aesthetic value.

# Starting a Dental Career and a Family (Michigan and South Florida, mid 1950s-mid 1960s)

After graduating from high school, Swanson attended Albion College where he took photos for his fraternity. He then went to the University of Michigan School of Dentistry in Ann Arbor, where he met his future wife, nursing student Josephine "Jo" Osmun. He and Jo moved to Lake Worth, Florida in 1961 with their first son Michael, and later had two more children, Mark and Matthew.

Having shifted his focus to studying for school, establishing a dental practice and raising a family, Swanson's photographic activities from the late 1950s to the mid-1960s generally revolved around documenting family events (usually with a medium format camera).

### Photographic Experimentation and Mastery (South Florida, late 1960s-early 70s)

In the late 1960s Swanson decided to return to photography as a serious artistic endeavor, focusing on black and white image making. He purchased a 35mm SLR camera, built his own darkroom, began to assemble a large library of books on photography technique and history, and started taking pictures whenever he had free time.

In 1970 Swanson entered his first juried exhibition after resuming photography — and won "Best of Show." In 1973 he attended a workshop led by renowned photographer Ruth Bernhard, who inspired Swanson to refine his craft. His early 1970s photographs generally were abstract, conceptual or whimsical images often created with the assistance of family members or darkroom techniques. The photographs demonstrate a mastery of composition and use of light in addition to a well-developed sense of improvisation.

During this period Swanson continued to photograph family events and travel (now using 35mm cameras and Kodachrome slides). He also pursued two of his other interests: kite making/flying (he was an early member of the American Kitefliers Association) and music (he was a self-taught amateur jazz piano player).

### Putting Down Roots in Western North Carolina (1973-74)

In 1973 Swanson and his wife decided to build a vacation home further north to get away from the hot Florida summers. They chose the Blue Ridge Mountains of Western North Carolina and in 1974

oversaw the completion of their "cabin in the woods" in the small town of Newland. Swanson would soon divide his time between Florida and North Carolina, where he became enamored with the southern Appalachian culture, picturesque setting, and outdoor recreational opportunities (especially hiking and kayaking). He almost always had a camera with him when he ventured out.

# The Contemporary Artist (mid 1970s-1980s)

By the mid-1970s Swanson had become familiar with the photography of his contemporaries, including Mark Cohen, Bruce Davidson, Elliott Erwitt, Lee Friedlander, Eva Rubinstein and Garry Winogrand, and he participated in workshops led by the latter two artists. Swanson quickly expanded his subject matter and approach. Exploring his South Florida environs, he found himself drawn to local fairs and flea markets and their variety of people and activities. The result was a collection of fascinating visual documents of human character, culture and place.

Swanson often referred to his portfolio of older and newer works as "Second Generation Photographs" because they reflected two eras in America separated by 30 years in the life of the photographer. Aesthetically speaking, much of the imagery Swanson created in the 1940s and 1950s was part of the social documentary tradition, so his pursuit of contemporary "street photography" in the 1970s and 1980s was a natural extension of an earlier approach to image making. No doubt his early experience, combined with the freedom of movement afforded by an SLR camera, gave him the confidence to capture his later subjects with greater intimacy and improvisation. These qualities characterized most of his 1980s photographs, whether taken at a Florida flea market, along a California street or on a North Carolina family's porch.

During the 1980s Swanson's photographs were accepted into dozens of national juried exhibitions and won several awards. In 1986 his work was featured in the exhibition *New Developments: Contemporary American Photo Work* at the Meisel Gallery in New York City. Many museums and other institutions acquired his photographs for their permanent collections.

# Returning Home (Michigan and North Carolina, 1990s-2000s)

By the 1990s Swanson felt he had achieved as much as he could in the fine art photography world, and as he transitioned into retirement he adopted a more relaxed approach to image making. He and his wife sold their house in Lake Worth and moved to a smaller home in Fernandina Beach, Florida. But North Carolina was where they preferred to spend their time and by now they had expanded their "cabin in the woods" into a proper home; Swanson even recreated his original Florida darkroom in North Carolina. In his new darkroom Swanson printed several copies of his best photographs and donated a complete set of prints to the library in Vassar, Michigan, where he would travel frequently to visit his mother and go kayaking with a friend from his college days.

Swanson continued to take photographs in Western North Carolina, documenting the local people and culture in various communities in Avery, Mitchell and Watauga counties. He created some of his last photographs for a workshop at nearby Penland School of Craft. For the workshop he converted a vintage Graflex 4x5 camera into a pinhole-style camera, returning to a format he had used as a teenager, now with more intentional aesthetic goals. The resulting images are a series of ethereal landscapes and ghostly self-portraits that show a man near the end of his life but still exploring his creativity.

Swanson was in north Florida in the spring of 2009 when he was diagnosed with lung cancer. He had hoped to return to North Carolina one last time but the disease and the treatments took too great a toll. Swanson died on December 14, 2009 in Fernandina Beach, Florida, at the age of 76.

### The Richard C. "Dick" Swanson Collection

After Dick Swanson's death his son Mark started the search for an institution that would preserve his father's photography for posterity. In 2016, the Bentley Historical Library at the University of Michigan (Ann Arbor) acquired Swanson's core photography collection for its archives. The collection includes over 300 prints, original negatives, and personal papers. Several other institutions across the country have acquired extra original darkroom prints.
